


Distinguished Professor Susan Scott is Professor of Theoretical Physics in the Centre for Gravitational Astrophysics at the Australian National University. Her research expertise is in gravity, general relativity theory, cosmology and gravitational waves. She is a member of the international team which achieved the first direct detection of gravitational waves in 2015. Her research has been recognised by her receipt of the 2020 Prime Minister's Prize for Science, and the international Dirac Medal for Theoretical Physics in 2020 and Blaise Pascal Medal for Physics in 2022.



Susan is a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science, the European Academy of Sciences, and the International Society on General Relativity and Gravitation. She is passionate about science and science education, and as a woman and the proud mum of two daughters, cares deeply about the participation of women in science and policy making which will determine the future health of our planet.

Dr Brad Tucker is an Astrophysicist/Cosmologist at the Research School of Astronomy and Astrophysics, Mt. Stromlo Observatory and the National Centre for the Public Awareness of Science, at the Australian National University. Brad received Bachelor's degrees in Physics, Philosophy, and Theology from the University of Notre Dame and a PhD in Astrophysics and Cosmology from Mt. Stromlo Observatory at the ANU. He's leading programs using the NASA's Kepler Space Telescope and TESS to understand why and how stars blow up. He's also building a network of ultraviolet telescopes in the upper atmosphere, and a search to find Planet 9.



Brad frequently gives talks to school groups and the public about Astronomy and has regular segments on various radio and TV stations. He has also developed a series of Astronomy coins with the Royal Australian Mint, consulted on science fiction movies, and has been featured in TV specials. He is currently in the process of writing his first popular book and has developed an online Astronomy course.



Not long after the Big Bang, the universe was filled with an extremely dense fog of neutral hydrogen atoms (a proton, a neutron and an electron). As the first stars emerged, their energy heated the surrounding hydrogen gas, causing ionisation (or removing the electrons). At first, these areas were like small bubbles, and as the bubbles grew and punched ever-larger holes into the neutral universe, they eventually began to overlap, enabling ionising

The dynamical and changing nature, and the involvement of a wide range of complex physical mechanisms make acquiring a comprehensive picture of fi rst star formation a challenging task. This hydrodymical computer simulations use the laws of physics, mathematical algorithms and our understanding of gravity, turbulence, magnetic fi elds, radiation and feedback mechanisms to simulate the creation and evolution of the first stars in the universe.



Computer Simulations - Virgo consortium. The Millenium run is a computer simulation used to investigate how the distribution of matter in the universe has evolved over time and how observed galaxies were formed. It traces over 10 billion "particles" - each particle represents approximately a billion solar masses of dark matter. The region of space simulated is a cube of about 2 billion light years as its length and contains about 20 million galaxies.

The IllustrisTNG project is an ongoing series of large, cosmological magnetrohydrodymical simulations of galaxy formation. These simulations aim to illuminate the physical processes that drive galaxy formation - to understand how galaxies evolve into the structures that we can observe in the night sky. The simulations use state-of-the-art numerical code which includes a comprehensive physical model that runs on some of the largest supercomputers in the world.

We want to see equal access and employment opportunities for artists living with disability - Professional, Capable and Fabulous.

Chamaeleon have performed across the ACT including AStellar Lineup at Belco Arts, Enlighten, Floriade and head lining at the 2024 National Folk Festival. In 2024 they represented the ACT at the World Down Syndrome Congress, Brisbane.

**Stellar Director,** Liz Lea is an award winning artist with an international practice spanning 30 years, having toured internationally with commissions in India, UK, Australia, South Africa, Singapore, Kuwait and USA. She directs the BOLD and DANscienCE Festivals and The Stellar Company. She was the 2017 the ACT Artist of the Year and toured her one woman show RED internationally for 5 years. She works across Australa/Asia and delights in creating new collaborative connections. She is an Access Advisor for Accessible Arts, has provided Audio Description for Dan Daw, Rebus and Sydney Dance Company and is developing ShowGO, an app to support access services.

#### **Chamaeleon Collective**

Karin Rønnng-Meagher, (Karin Adriansdatter) Chamaeleon Co Director, is a diversely skilled visual and performing artist who trained in the US and was danced professionally in New York. Since 2013, Karin has been a performer & participant at the annual Canberra 'Precipice Festival', held at Gorman Arts Centre each September. Patricia Hayes Kavanagh is an alumni of QL2 Dance who went on to further her training at the Sydney Dance Company Pre-Professional Year in their two year course. Since grauduating she joined ADP as joint ADP/QL2 Dance Intern in 2021 before joining the company as a Junior Party Artist in 2022. Patricia has recently joined the ADP Team designing company merchandise and enhancing her creative talents. Patricia began properly training in contemporary at 15. At QL2, Patricia was able to expand her knowledge and understanding of dance, herself, and the world that she lives in. Graduating Year 12 in 2018, she went on to complete her Advanced Diploma in Elite Performance at Sydney Dance Company's Pre-Professional Year in 2020. Since returning to Canberra, she began an internship with QL2 and Australian Dance Party to further develop her artistry and practice.
